We then followed the River Helmsdale for the first stop at RSPB Forsinard - the area has recently been designated UNESCO World Heritage status and a trip to the viewing tower provided a vast panorama of this important peatland landscape. June 2024

The club run on 11th June, kindly organized by Patsy Thompson, was a select affair of only four cars probably because of the distances involved and the competition from other car activities in the month. Having met at the Ralia Café just off the A9 near Newtonmore, the route went via Dalwhinnie and the A9 to Trinafour and Tummel Bridge. Then it was on to Aberfeldy and a bit of the Rob Roy Road to the Highland Chocolatier at Grandtully where much chocolate was consumed! It was a reminder of the beautiful scenery and quiet roads just off the A9.

16th June, the day of the Tain Rally, started off VERY wet which obviously had an effect on the overall turnout. However, MG owners are made of sterner stuff so there was an excellent number of cars on the stand. The shelter made its value felt again. Erecting it in the pouring rain was not very pleasant but worth it even though it was quite cosy for the numbers seeking shelter! The rain did ease off later in the morning but it left the park quite waterlogged in places and curtailed a lot of activities. It was a great pity for the organisers who put such a lot of effort into the arrangements but they were quite philosophical about their first really bad day in fifteen years.

Nine cars from Highland (ten, including a pleasant but unexpected appearance by John Ducker) attended the Gathering of the Clans at the Grampian Transport Museum at Alford. All the arrangements by the Aberdeen Club were meticulous, the venue was excellent and the weather reminded us what summer is supposed to be like. Altogether it was a very enjoyable and successful event with the opportunity to meet members from other areas.

May 2024

At the end of April, following Drive-it Day, 18 MGs (including “day-trippers”) embarked on the 3-day Spring Saunter based in Grantown-on-Spey and organised by Richard in his usual efficient fashion. Highlights included visits to the Moray Motor Museum in Elgin and Kildrummy Castle. The weather was very kind (dry, bright but cool) until the departure day when there was some snow!

On 14th May, 9 MGs and an everyday car gathered at the Highland Farm Café near Dingwall for a coffee (and perhaps a cake) before a minor-road drive to Dunrobin Castle for a group visit. There was a bit of haar but this soon cleared to give a bright and sunny day until the trip home although the breeze was chilly. From Bonar Bridge we took a very little-travelled road past Loch Buidhe and down Strath Carnaig to the Mound and the A9. Road works in Bonar Bridge diverted us into a housing estate at which point signage stopped! There was a bit of reversing and '3-point' turning until we found our way out. As well as the Castle and grounds, most of us visited the eerie museum and watched the falconry display with a Harris's hawk and Peregrine falcon demonstrating their skills. The Rover P2 owned for over 35 years was more recently joined in his garage by the well-known MGC GT which was always kept in pristine condition. Tim was always good company with his good humour and fund of stories and he will be sadly missed. We extend sincere condolences to Chris and the rest of the family.

The End-of-Season lunch on 15th November signalled the end of the Club's activities for the year. The next event will be the AGM in January when we can look back over the year and start putting together the programme for 2024. Best wishes to all for Christmas & the New Year.

October 2023

This year's Autumn Amble took place between 2nd & 5th October based at the Panmure Arms Hotel in Edzell, Angus – another venue well chosen by Stuart both for its location and standard of food and service. As usual, Richard had arranged an interesting and well-planned itinerary with a detailed road-book to prevent us getting lost. Eleven cars and eighteen people took part with some meeting up at Ballindalloch on the Monday morning to go *via* the Lecht and Cairn o'Mount while others went direct to Edzell in beautiful weather. The weather remained fine for the Tuesday when we travelled to Montrose Air Station Heritage Centre. This was our second visit and very interesting as before with some new exhibits. It was nice to meet several local MG owners before proceeding to an excellent lunch at the Charleton Fruit Farm, after which we went our separate ways to explore the locality. The weather was decidedly damp on the Wednesday which was fine for us since the planned activity was a visit to the National Trust for Scotland's House of Dun, a magnificent 18th Century mansion retaining much of its original decoration, furniture etc. After another excellent lunch of sandwiches, cakes and coffee, some took part in a run up Glen Clova and back while others again stayed closer at hand. Thursday morning came round all too soon so it was time to set off home with many happy memories and with thanks Richard and Stuart for all their efforts which made for such an enjoyable event. That concludes our programme of runs for this year but there is to be the usual end-of-season lunch in November and we shall, of course, be looking at getting together every so often over the winter on Zoom.

September 2023

Thanks to David & Elaine for arranging the September run and providing the following report : we chose to visit Lairg, one of our favourite haunts, but meeting at the Highland Farm Cafe above Dingwall. Five intrepid MGs set off in glorious sunshine (for a change!) and it was so nice to see Tim & Christine there to see us off. The route takes in some breathtaking scenery – we really are blessed with stunning scenery and roads in the Highlands! We interrupted our drive with a short stop at Falls of Shin where, at this time of year, salmon can often be seen leaping but they were not in evidence that day. Perhaps they were on strike just like the rest of the country it seems! It was worth the stop as it meant Nick and Jean could catch up (we weren't going that fast – honest, Officer!). Richard also re-joined after stopping to retrieve his cap, blown off by a passing truck. Lunch at The Pier in Lairg was as tasty as ever and, after our usual blether, we went our separate ways. Separately, Richard reports that nine Highland MGs attended the MG 100 Ecosse event at Doune. While the day turned wet in the afternoon, it was very well attended and much enjoyed. At least it proved the wise investment in the new gazebo which withstood the elements very well. Five of our MGs did the run up the famous hill-climb (a 'parade' not a race!) Those who stayed to the end were rewarded with a look at the new MG Cyberster. Our last main event of the season is the “Autumn Amble” in October based at Edzell in Angus where Richard and Stuart have arranged an excellent hotel and a full programme.

August 2023

Sixteen members in nine cars took part in the August run organised by Gill & Chris taking in some hidden corners and roads less travelled on the Black Isle. For those not familiar with the area, the Black Isle is a peninsula, not an island, lying just to the North of Inverness. There are also various theories about why it's called "black", one being that seen from a distance its heavily-wooded aspect made it seem black. At approximately 100 square miles in size, it reputedly contains nearly 1,000 miles of roads so there is plenty to explore. The former Burghs of Cromarty and Fortrose & Rosemarkie have much of interest to visit while Chanonry Point is one of the best vantage points in the UK at which to observe dolphins. After coffee and cakes at Conon Bridge, the group made their way along quiet minor roads to the lunch stop at Cromarty. The glorious summer weather afforded some fantastic views over the Cromarty Firth to the hills beyond. After lunch, the group split up to explore the various attractions in the town, including Hugh Miller's House, the Courthouse and the ancient East Church (as well as indulging in some retail therapy) before heading off home. David and Elaine Hitchmough are planning the September run to the West Coast.

July 2023

July being the height of the summer events season when many members were involved other commitments (including holidays, Le Mans Classic etc), it was decided to postpone the month's run which is now scheduled for 17th August. It was gratifying to see Richard's excellent report on our Spring Saunter featured in the July issue but, not resting on their laurels, Richard and Stuart have already made provisional bookings for the Spring Saunter 2024 based in Grantown-on-Spey! However, we still have plenty to look forward to this season, not least our involvement in the MG 100 event at Doune and our Autumn Amble in October.

June 2023

For the June run, Patsy organised a route commencing at Grantown-on-Spey and travelling over the Lecht (the A939 Cockbridge-Tomintoul road which intrigued Terry Wogan) to Royal Deeside for lunch. Afterwards, the group paid a visit to the Wild Horse Welfare Centre at Belwade Farm near Aboyne. The Centre works across the full spectrum of the horse world, both in the UK and abroad, to improve welfare and the horse-human partnership through care, research, education and influence.

After a very interesting and informative visit, the group made their separate ways home.

The Tain Rally was held on 18th June and retains its place as one of the largest and best-attended events in the area with almost 500 entries across all classes. There was a good turnout of MGs with fifteen on the Club stand and others, both members and non-members, scattered around the field. It was the first opportunity to put up the Club's new shelter/gazebo which proved a welcome sanctuary on a very warm and sunny day.

Chris & Gill are arranging the July run which will comprise some "roads less travelled" to discover a few hidden corners of the Black Isle.

May 2023

For the May run, Richard had concocted a route in Easter Ross taking in both the ancient and modern : from some of the Pictish carved stone slabs dating from around 800 A D to the wind-turbine assembly facility at Nigg on the Cromarty Firth. Starting from the Highland Farm Café, the route took in the steep private road to the North Sutor overlooking the Cromarty Firth then *via* the Pictish stones at Nigg Church, Balintore and Hilton of Cadboll. On the way to the lunch stop at the Inver Inn, Richard pointed out the remains of the WW2 airfields still quite prominent in the area. The weather was pleasant enough to have lunch outside before heading off to the final stop at the lighthouse at Tarbatness. Sadly, however, the haar (mist) had come in off the sea blanking out the views so, after a bracing walk to the lighthouse, members made a hasty retreat to disperse for home. The June run is being organised by Patsy and will involve a trip over the Lecht (the Cockbridge to Tomintoul road which caught Terry Wogan's fancy) to Royal Deeside.

April 2023

Thanks to Richard's meticulous arrangements, 23 members enjoyed a convivial pre-season lunch at the Conon Bridge Hotel on 4th April and 20 members took part in the Club's own Drive-it Day run on the 23rd. The lunch was an excellent occasion to meet up and learn about purchases, sales and tinkering over the winter while the run to Gairloch provided the first opportunity to get together with the cars. 11 MGs (and an Audi TT pretender) took part on a fairly dreich day when only Jon & Julie were hardy (foolhardy?) enough to put the hood down on the TF. Through Jon & Julie's good offices, a soup-and-sandwich lunch was arranged at the Shieldaig Lodge Hotel at Badachro near Gairloch in a spectacular location on the sea-shore. After lunch, some returned home direct while others completed the loop to Braemore Junction and visited the impressive new National Trust for Scotland Visitor Centre at Corrieshalloch Gorge. The month will conclude with the Spring Saunter to Garvault (the subject of a separate report in due course) and the Forres Rally which returns after a pandemic-enforced hiatus. Finally a warm welcome to new member, Gary Bridge from North Ballachulish who has a 1971 MGB roadster – we look forward to seeing him and his car at our meetings.

March 2023

Another quiet month enlivened by the quiz on Zoom organised by Chris & Gill in which Tim & Christine came out on top. Richard also showed a video from the USA comparing the merits of the various models of Sprite/Midget and concluding that a rubber-bumper is still viable transport for long journeys on American freeways...that's brave considering the size of most other vehicles over there! So, roll on April when the season really gets under way with the pre-season lunch, Spring Saunter and Drive-it Day to look forward to. All the details are on the website as usual.

May 2022 :

There was a good turnout of 21 members at the pre-season lunch at North Kessock. It was great to meet up in person again and to greet new member Tony Gill who adds another BGT V8 to the ranks. Richard Penman (TF) has also joined us so welcome to him too.

Eight cars and 14 Highland MG Owners' Club members finally got to enjoy the Spring Saunter in late April that had originally been scheduled for 2020. Most of us met at the Highland Café near Dingwall before heading off to Achnasheen where 2 more MGs joined before meeting the last couple with their MG TF in Gairloch. Away from the east coast, the weather was stunning for the first day although a bit chilly at times. The Gairloch Heritage Centre was admired by around half of us before we found lunch then set off in small groups for the drive to our accommodation for 2 nights, the excellent Highland Hotel in Lairg. The following day started grey as we drove northwards to a very minor (grass growing in the middle) road towards Hope (aptly named as we all hoped to get there in one piece). We stopped at the Iron Age Dun Dornaigil broch and tried to imagine life around 260 BC. Further on was the visit to Smoo Cave before bursting into brilliant sunlight on the road to Laxford Bridge. We then turned left to run back to Lairg on a most stunning road. The last day saw 2 MGs dash to Inverness to join the local Drive-it Day together with 3 other members and over 30 classic cars in a single-track route to Logie Steading. The damp (haar) weather didn't spoil a very convivial occasion. (Many thanks to Richard & Stuart for the arrangements and to Richard for the report)

We are looking forward to the drive on 10th May which David & Elaine Hitchmough are arranging heading to the Grantown area with lunch planned at the Glenfiddich Distillery while Chris and Gill Silver are preparing the June event – information and contact details on the website as usual.

June 2022 :

Ten cars (including one modern VW Tiguan interloper) took part in the June Run arranged by Chris and Gill along the East Coast *via* Nairn and Forres to Lossiemouth. On the way, we stopped at the ruins of the 11th Century Kinloss Abbey where the modern cemetery is still in use and also contains a Commonwealth War Graves section reflecting the long history of the former RAF Kinloss base nearby, now an Army Barracks. There is also the grave of a naval officer killed in the Battle of Jutland in 1916. After lunch at the Twenty Nineteen Café near Lossiemouth we continued the military theme by visiting the adjacent Covesea Lighthouse and the RAF/Fleet Air Arm Heritage Centre. Now decommissioned, the Lighthouse is owned by a Community Company and provides panoramic coastal views as well as overlooking RAF Lossiemouth.

It was also great to be back at the Tain Rally after a break of two years. It is one of the biggest in the area and 12 cars were displayed on the Club stand which Richard organised. A cold breeze made warm jackets mandatory but at least it stayed dry. We also welcomed two new members : John Farquhar from Elgin with his TC and Graham Watson from North Kessock who runs several MGs as part of his classic hire business.

In July, we'll be celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the founding of the Club with a nostalgic drive round Loch Ness to replicate the very first Club run in 2002.

July 2022 :

Thirteen cars took part in the run on 5th July to mark the 20th anniversary of the setting up of the Club, Chris and Gill being the only founder members of the Club remaining. Following the same route circumnavigating Loch Ness as the first Club Run in 2002, Richard's meticulous planning saw us departing Inverness on a bright, sunny morning but with a brisk breeze. After a coffee stop at Invermoriston, we carried on through Fort Augustus and up the East side of the Loch to the lunch stop at Foyers where lunch was arranged at the Craigdarroch Hotel – as on the first occasion twenty years ago! While not normally open for lunch for non-residents, the hotel opened specially and provided a very warm welcome and a spectacular lunch. Happily, John Ducker was able to join us in his Honda Jazz whilst his MGB is still under repair although Mary was sadly unable to accompany him due to ill-health. Nick & Patsy Thomson were also prevented from coming due to a “mechanical malfunction” en route. It was a very pleasant occasion to reminisce about the early days of the Club but also to appreciate its current strength after various ups and downs.

There was a good turnout of members at the Historic Wheels Rally on 24th July which returned to its traditional venue at Brodie Castle after a two-year break due to the pandemic, though without the usual road run or lunch. There was a good attendance by the public and a short, sharp shower just before the prize-giving did little to take the shine off an enjoyable day.

This month we welcome new members Alistair and Alexander Todd from Avoch who have two ZTTs, an MG TF and an MGF which is being converted to electric power. That will be an interesting addition to the Club!

Our August run, organised by Tim & Christine, is centred on Attadale Gardens near Lochcarron.

August 2022 :

The destination for our August run, organised in their usual efficient fashion by Tim and Christine, was Attadale Gardens situated on the shore of Loch Carron near Kyle of Lochalsh where the relatively mild climate engendered by the Gulf Stream means that a wide variety of exotic species can flourish. As on previous visits, we were privileged to be allowed to park in front of the House, the original part of which dates from 1755, where we were welcomed enthusiastically by three generations of the owning family. Eight cars took part, plus a modern BMW since David and Elaine had suffered a clutch malfunction on the Midget on the Moray Miglia the previous weekend which could not be fixed in time. The first part of the run to Achnasheen for a coffee stop was in glorious sunshine but, by the time we reached Attadale, hoods had to be raised and umbrellas unfurled to explore the Gardens as a period of showery rain set in. Fortunately, this soon passed and we were able to enjoy our picnic lunch in warm sunshine enjoying the vista from the House. The Gardens contain woodland walks, many different species of trees and plants, a Japanese garden, viewpoints and intriguing sculptures and statues which make for a most interesting and enjoyable visit. After lunch, Tim guided us back round the Loch through Lochcarron Village and down the single-track road to North Strome and Ardaneaskan. It is hard to imagine that this was once the main road to Kyle *via* the ferry. Altogether a most enjoyable and interesting day.

We welcome another new member this month, Richard MacLennan from Inverness who has a 1969 MGB GT.

The September run is being organised by David and Elaine on a route round the Strathnairn area.

September 2022:

For our September Club drive, David devised a demanding route for the ten intrepid MG-ers that would start at Daviot Church, south of Inverness, and see us traverse Strathnairn several times before heading over to Strathdearn.

The roads were new to most of our members and comprised mainly narrow, very twisty single-track roads typical of the rural Highlands. The views were stunning and the many lochs we passed were majestic. A monstrous morning coffee and cake stop was arranged at Dores on the banks of Loch Ness. I'm sure Nessie waved at us as we continued on our winding way.

After traversing Strathnairn, we ventured over to neighbouring Strathdearn *via* the infamous Garbole-Farr road. This is the ninth highest pass in Scotland and was used on the 1960 RAC International Rally and other events as a closed stage (thanks to some lateral thinking by the local authority!) This proved a little too much for some as one member lost the clutch in their "B" and the twisty undulating nature of the road triggered nausea in a passenger. The weather did not help either as thunderstorms were forecast. Fortunately, we made it to the lunch stop at the Three Bridges Café at Tomatin before the heavens opened. Nevertheless, it was a greatly enjoyed drive which was slightly different to our normal route types.

Also during the month, several members met up at Beaulieu with a group of French owners on their way to do the NC 500 and two Richards (Jenner & Penman) made their way to Doune for the "Gathering of the Clans". This was a very enjoyable day and thanks are due to Nigel Macmillan and his team for the excellent arrangements.

October 2022

We had a *very* wet Autumn Amble based around three nights in Stirling at the Highland Gate Hotel. A total of 10 Highland MGs (an MGA, several 'modern' TFs, a B-GT, a C-GT, 2 Midgets and an MG3) were joined by a guest B-GT V8 all the way from Moreton-in-Marsh. The first full day involved a visit to the Kelpies then the Falkirk Wheel (some issues with water levels despite all the rain so we just did the rotation ride rather than the full ride through the tunnel) and then on to the fascinating Summerlee Museum of Scottish Industrial Life in Coatbridge. The second day was a 125-mile circular drive over several named passes and with a lot of single-track roads. We were joined by 5 members of Stirling MGOC (3 MGs: a B-GT, TF and an RV8) giving a total of 14 MGs for what was a challenging drive at times over roads resembling rivers and including a drive-up Dollar Glen to Castle Campbell. However, from the feedback and despite the weather, it was a very enjoyable and sociable event. Thanks as usual to Richard & Stuart for the excellent arrangements.

We also welcome this month new members Dr Nick & Mrs Jean Simpson who live near Beaully and have a 1954 TF.

After the end of season lunch on 22nd November, we intend to revert to Zoom meetings over the winter, including the AGM, to keep in touch with members in such a widespread area.

For 2023, the Spring Saunter to Sutherland is already booked up and provisional arrangements are in hand for the Autumn Amble based in Angus so we're looking forward to the New Year already!

November 2022

With many cars now tucked away for the winter, we are entering a period of reduced activity but 24 members did enjoy the end-of-season lunch at the Conon Bridge Hotel on 22nd November.

Organised by Richard to his usual high standards, the venue and the meal were both excellent and a great way to round off the year in company with friends old and new.
